

Parenting Fund: Managing Risk Workshop

What is the workshop about?

Managing risk is a critical area for organisations to be on top of at all times. It is important that an organisation can identify the major risks it faces as well as establish ways to manage these risks. This will enable a charity to make a positive statement on risk in its trustees' Annual Report, which helps demonstrate accountability to stakeholders. This workshop identifies the main types of risks to be aware of, the impact risk can have on your organisation if not managed and the main ways to help your organisation manage risk.

What will I get out of the workshop?

Workshop participants will leave the day with an understanding of the principles of risk management and the benefits it provides to their organisation. Participants will also have the opportunity to make a practical start on applying this in their own organisation, with the benefit of discussion with others.

Workshop participants will also be more informed to consider the type of tailored support they would like to receive from the Parenting Fund in the future.

The workshop will include:

- How to develop and implement a Business Recovery and Disaster Plan
